# How to safeguard your legacy and renew Canada's: A message from the president



The Canada I grew up in was one where most Canadians believed in the goal that Martin Luther King Jr. famously enunciated in 1963 for his own country: that men, women, and children would one day be judged not "by the color of their skin but by the content of their character."

Thus, all my life I've looked at people as individuals and fought for equal opportunity. I've fought for free enterprise so everyone can live with dignity, pay their mortgage, and feed their kids; for average taxpayers; for the natural resource industry whose workers and livelihoods are under attack by antieconomic reality vandals; for spending on the poor and not the politically-connected; and for the equal treatment of all and special privileges for none.

I've lobbied and written entire books on why governments should spend smarter, tax less, and stop harming our property rights; why responsibility and not chronic victim-thinking matter; and why our civilization is too valuable to cede to those who cancel history just because it—as with every one of us—is imperfect.

I've also tried to help others advance a freer, more flourishing Canada. One example is a study on "honour killings" I commissioned to expose the danger of some cultural beliefs to immigrant women. That report went viral and it found a champion in then-federal cabinet minister Rona Ambrose. That was a groundbreaking analysis of a new threat to freedom and how it affected the most

vulnerable. Such innovative and frank policy work is exactly what I'd like to help advance in the future because everyone deserves the opportunity for a better life.

# **Everyone's family built Canada**

Just before the Great Depression one of my grandmothers cleaned homes in Edmonton to help her family stay afloat. During the 1930s, my grandparents on both sides worked their farms to eke out a living. In the depths of the early 1980s recession, my mom worked at a Sears coffee shop to help pay the bills.

That's how my family helped build Canada. Your family likely has similar stories.

We face new challenges today from those who are anti-reality and anti-responsibility, and who see only past problems but not Canada's virtues. The board and I want to help every Canadian, including younger and newer Canadians, focus on building Canada up. # CANADA: A SUCCESS STORY

#### THE FACTS

From the first arrivals 20,000 years ago to those from Europe, Asia, and Africa, all built modern-day Canada and made it the success it is. Its foundational principles are the rule of law, equality of the individual, shared humanity, scientific progress, freedom, and free enterprise. These values made Canada full of opportunity, ever-more welcoming to diverse peoples, tolerant, and with freedoms hard-won over the centuries with spent blood and treasure.

#### THE PROBLEM

Despite those striking achievements, simplistic narratives have taken root. That's why:

- Previous generations of Canadians are compared not to other countries in 1867 or 1960 but to today and even to utopian expectations of perfection;
- The charge of racism is now flung about carelessly with accusations that incomes, success, and Canada itself all result from "privilege" and racism;
- Cancel culture takes aim at Canada's history our founders, and even churches;
- The idea of a shared and universal humanity is disappearing. Canadians are increasingly not defined
  by the content of their character and their achievements, but by colour, ethnicity, and gender;
- · Government directed privilege trumps merit, free enterprise, and earned respect;
- The notion of objective reality is threatened with reason, science, and even math attacked as racist;
- Free thought and free inquiry are discouraged, muted, and self-censored in schools, universities, media, corporations, politics and social media. Nuance and debate are "out" and extremism, mob behaviour, and monocausal explanations for perceived ills are in.

# THE RATIONALE FOR A NEW THINK TANK

All the foregoing has led to a reckless new narrative: That past generations and their ideas and ideals—free expression, free enterprise, private property, religious freedom, equality of the individual, self-responsibility, and the rule of law—were inherently faulty.

This narrative has led to the notion that topdown, controlled outcomes are preferable to free expression and free inquiry, and to equality of opportunity and diverse paths. This narrative also undermines the vision of a shared humanity and empathy for others.

Across the education system from kindergarten to university all of these damaging notions—and many more—are being taught to your children and grandchildren in ways that are little different from indoctrination.

The result will be a poorer Canada in every sense. That is why one of our goals is to reach students with facts, reason, and stories of how Canada was built into a flourishing success story—for everyone.

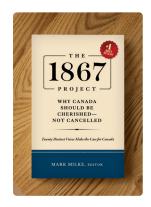

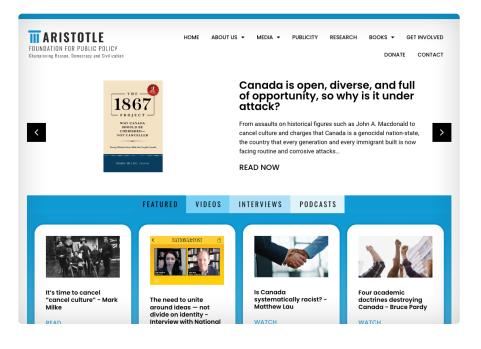

 Their videos are akin to movie trailers. A screenshot of one author, Matthew Lau, is below. In the video, Lau explains why Canada is not systemically racist.



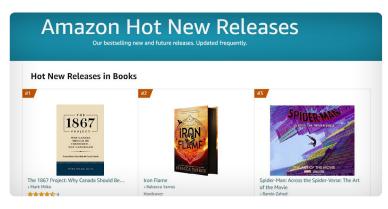

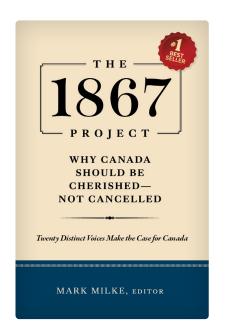
