In the late 1920s, my grandmother cleaned homes in Edmonton to help her immigrant family make a new life in Canada. During the 1930s, my grandparents on both sides toiled on their farms to survive the Great Depression. In the depths of the early 1980s recession, my mom worked at a Sears coffee shop to help pay the bills.

Most Canadian families have stories like these—yours included. Whether one's ancestors arrived 20,000 years ago or two years ago, everyone's family built the Canada we know today.

But today, some attack the oak tree that is Canada, which took centuries to build. That only makes us weak at the very time Canada needs to be stronger—when the world is becoming more dangerous and chaotic.

At the Aristotle Foundation, we take a different, constructive approach: A blemish in Canadian history or in policies now is like a branch you prune to make the tree healthier and bigger. - Canada incorporated ever-more people into our national fabric—often successfully

The Problem

Canada is being attacked from within and from without.

Canadians are increasingly being defined not by the content of their character and their achievements, but by colour, ethnicity, and gender—the "DEI" approach

Unbalanced attacks on Canadian history are routine

The notion of objective reality is undermined with the result that excellence, education, and students are shortchanged

Free thought and free inquiry are discouraged, muted, and selfcensored in schools, universities, media, corporations, politics, and social media

Anti-Western radicals threaten fellow Canadians on our streets, campuses, and malls, and even in front of hospitals, schools, and synagogues

From the earliest arrivals 20,000 years ago across the Bering Strait to the contributions of later immigrants from Europe, Asia, and Africa, everyone's families built modern-day Canada and made it the success it is today.



Are DEI Programs Working For All?

Some 56% of American workers believe corporate diversity, equity and inclusion policies are a good thing, according to Pew, but support of DEI cuts sharply on party lines.

Democrats or those who lean that way overwhelmingly support DEI (78%), yet only 30% of Republicans or lean Republican feel the same. And an equal share (30%) believe DEI is a bad thing.

Some feel DEI policies have been more exclusionary than inclusionary, e.g., straight white men, and research has found that so-called DEI training may do more harm than good in achieving harmony in the workplace.

A paper by Professor David Millard Haskell published by the Canadias Aristode Foundation for Public Policy, entitled "What DEB research concludes about diversity training," that cites more than 44 academic studies, concludes, "When it comes to harmony and telerance, DEI does not make things better, but can make things success."


